Teen Club meets weekly at Conejo Creek Condominiums in collaboration with Borchard Community Center every Tuesday from 5-7pm, with up to 30 teens attending. Another group meets in the Los Feliz area every Thursday from 4-5:30pm, serving about 20 teens each week.

Teen Club is all about meeting new people, building skills, and having a place to belong.

Each week includes snacks, games, homework help, crafts, and fun activities—plus opportunities to learn and grow with supportive mentors.

During winter break, we welcomed teens from several schools to the Teen Center for a "Youth Outreach Friendsmas." This event provided an inclusive and celebratory space for teens to connect, expand their social circles, ease social anxiety, and break down cliques. 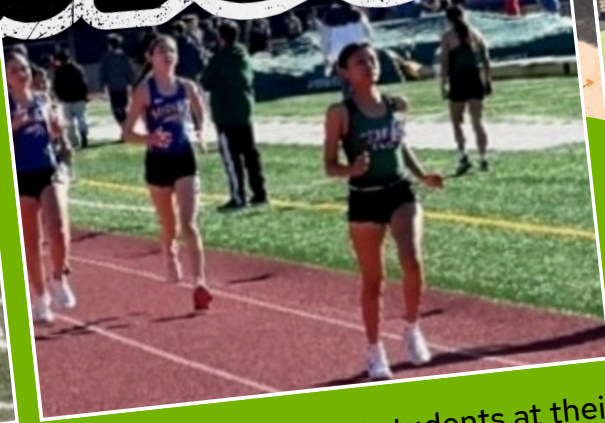
NYE BASH TAKEOVER
