The Conejo Recreation and Park District has been serving the Conejo Valley since 1963. Beginning with less than two acres, the District now manages over one thousand acres of parkland at more than forty locations. In addition, the District protects nearly fifteen thousand acres of natural open space and maintains over one hundred miles of trails through the Conejo Open Space Conservation Agency - an award-winning partnership between the City of Thousand Oaks and Conejo Recreation and Park District. The Recreation Program Guide, published quarterly, offers a wide spectrum of recreational classes, activities and special events for citizens of all ages.

The Conejo Valley may have a beautiful climate and rich topography, but it is those with a collective commitment to community who make the Conejo Valley so hospitable. Involved and caring citizens, dedicated and generous volunteers, as well as government agencies, property owners, businesses and non-profit organizations working together have done marvelous things for our community. We are proud the Conejo Recreation and Park District has had a role in making the Conejo Valley what it is today.


This Timeline chronicles events important to the growth and evolution of the Conejo Valley from the perspective of the Conejo Recreation and Park District. It is not intended to capture every noteworthy historical event since 1963, but to provide greater understanding of how our parks, recreation and open space have evolved over the past 43 years, and to, perhaps, spark your imagination as to what may be possible in the years ahead.





ETI Conejo Riders Corral 37 is established. Currently, ETI Corral 37 is a tenant of CRPD's Conejo Creek Equestrian Center.





The five newly elected directors hold their first meeting at Park Oaks School in January. Their responsibilities would include choosing a General Manager, adoption of policies and guidelines, setting of goals, preparation of a budget and establishing a recreation program for the community. Joint use agreements with the school districts are negotiated so that recreation classes and programs can be offered in school facilities. District administration of the community center in Conejo Community Park (also known as "Dover and Hendrix") was negotiated with the Ventura County Parks Department.

In March, Conejo Valley Little League forms including kids throughout the Conejo Valley. Conejo Valley Little League would split in 1972 creating the Conejo Valley Little League and Thousand Oaks Little League. By 2006, CVLL has over 660 players on 55 teams for players 5 - 18 years old.

The Janess Corporation opens the Los Robles Golf Course including a pro-shop, meeting room and a restaurant called the Conejo Inn. Access to several of the holes is via tunnel under freeway onto property which is now The Oaks Shopping Center. The golf course would be transferred to the City in 1972 and the club house and meeting rooms were completely replaced in 2001.

A building purchased by the City from Janus Corporation is relocated to property donated by Louis and Kathleen Goebel. CRPD provides staff, and supervises the senior programs. In 1980 there were 2,800 activities offered at this site annually. Today there are more than 12,500 activities offered at the Goebel Senior Adult Center on Janus Road.

• In May and December 1975, efforts were made to pass a \$4.5 million bond. Despite the slogan, "People for Parks," voters are unwilling to take on new debt.

• Stagecoach Inn placed on National Register of Historic Places.

1975
The 53-acre Conejo Creek Park South was originally acquired in 1972 and the first soccer fields were completed in 1975. This is the largest sports turf area in the Conejo Valley and home to AYSO Region 9 as well as Conejo Valley Days. A big league baseball field was opened in this park in 2005.



The 4-acre Evenstar Park was acquired in 1971 and developed into a neighborhood park in 1975.



The 14-acre Oakbrook Neighborhood Park was first acquired in 1970. Five acres at the corner of Erbes Road and Pederson Road were improved as parkland in 1975.



1977
Conejo Open Space Conservation Agency (COSCA) formed as a Joint Powers Authority between the Conejo Recreation and Park District and City of Thousand Oaks to protect and manage natural open space.

Congress creates Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area.

The District partners with the City of Thousand Oaks to run the Youth Outreach Program designed to seek out and address the needs of non-involved and hard-to-reach youths.

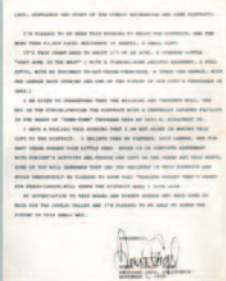

1978
The 9-acre Cañada Park property is owned by the Conejo Valley Unified School District. A 1978 cooperative agreement between CVUSD and CRPD has allowed four acres of this property to serve as a neighborhood park.



The 2-acre Suburbia Park acquired in 1969 became a neighborhood park in 1978.



1979
Donna "Conejo" Fargo, movie stunt woman with a passion for the Conejo Valley, donates her home to the Conejo Recreation and Park District. Her generous gift continues to "give" through ongoing lease revenues.



1980
The Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy was established by the California State Legislature in 1980. Since that time, it has helped to preserve over 55,000 acres of parkland in both wilderness and urban settings. The Conservancy's mission is to strategically buy back, preserve, protect, restore and enhance treasured pieces of Southern California.

In addition, Channel Islands National Monument becomes the Channel Islands National Park.



1981
The City of Westlake Village, on the Los Angeles side of the County line incorporates.



1980
The City of Thousand Oaks, County of Ventura, Conejo Valley Unified School District, and Conejo Recreation and Park District create an organization to address community substance abuse issues. Conejo Substance Abuse Authority evolved into Conejo Coalition for Youth and Families in 2003.

1981
Teen Summer Musical Program starts officially with the production of Lil' Abner at the Borchard Community Center. The summer program is now conducted annually at the Civic Arts Plaza.



1982
Coalition for the Arts between the Conejo Recreation and Park District, City of Thousand Oaks, and Arts Council of the Conejo Valley implemented in 1980 and formalized in 1982. Partnership resulted in shared operation of Arts Council Center and community-wide cultural events.

Western movie hero Joel McCrea and his wife, actress Frances Dee, donate 75 acres along the Norwegian Grade as a wildlife preserve to COSCA.

Nine acres of property at the corner of Capitán Street and Poplar Crest Avenue were acquired in 1971. In cooperation with the Conejo Valley Unified School District, 4 acres were developed as **Lynn Oaks Park** in 1983 and zoning would change from residential to Public Lands in 1984.



The 22-acre **Pepper Tree Playfield** was acquired in 1977 and is surrounded by...Peppertrees. Softball and soccer fields were developed in 1983.



This 4-acre **Southshore Hills Park** at the corner of Glasstonbury and Channelford near the Westlake Lake was acquired and developed in 1983.



Property for **Sunset Hills Park** was acquired in 1978. The 6-acre park was developed in 1983, and the zoning changed from residential to public lands in 1985.



1984
• Kingsbell deeds 188 acres of **Arroyo Conejo** (La Barranca) to the City of Thousand Oaks.



Joint Agreement of the City of Thousand Oaks and the Conejo Recreation & Park District, dated 1984, for the acquisition of the property at the corner of Capitán Street and Poplar Crest Avenue, known as Lynn Oaks Park.

1985
City of Thousand Oaks and Conejo Recreation and Park District, in a joint meeting, enter into a Joint Powers Agreement creating the Teen Center and Services Authority in 1985. Plans for both the Teen and Senior Adult Centers as well as land leases and operating agreements were approved in joint meetings with the City of Thousand Oaks and Conejo Recreation and Park District in 1988.

The Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority (MRCA) is a local government public entity established in 1985. MRCA is a local partnership between the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy, the Conejo Recreation and Park District, and the Rancho Simi Recreation and Park District. MRCA is dedicated to the preservation and management of local open space and parkland, watershed lands, trails, and wildlife habitat.

The Conejo Recreation and Park District contracts with the City of Westlake Village to provide recreation programs.

The 5-acre **Stagecoach Inn Park** just south of the Stagecoach Inn was acquired by the Conejo Recreation and Park District in 1979 and became a developed neighborhood park in 1985.

The 19-acre **Wildflower Playfield** was acquired in 1978 and developed in 1986 with soccer and softball fields, lighted tennis and basketball courts, a restroom and playground.

Artwalk, a two-day juried fine arts and designer crafts exhibition, begins and is presented by the Conejo Valley Art Museum with assistance from CRPD.

City of Thousand Oaks approves agreement transferring 228 acres of the Wildwood Mesa from Orange Builders to the Conejo Open Space Conservation Agency (COSCA.)

The 7-acre **Spring Meadow Park** was acquired in 1978 and developed into a neighborhood park in 1987. This park's unique feature... a croquet court.



1988
City of Thousand Oaks approves master-planned community of Dos Ventos Ranch and preserves 1,205 acres of open space.



1989
The Conejo Open Space Trails Advisory Committee (COSTAC) is formed to provide recommendations for location and use of open space trails.



1989
The Thousand Oaks Teen Center opens. Built by the City and operated by CRPD staff, the 14,000 square foot facility has a game room, class rooms and a gymnasium.



1990
Goebel Senior Adult Center opens. The 17,000 square foot full service Senior Adult Center is operated by the District after being constructed by the City.



1989
In 1989 the South Coast Water Polo Club was formed. The first season included one team and 10 players. In 2006, SCWPC has over 200 members on boys and girls teams.

El Parque de la Paz • 5 Acres



1989
El Parque de la Paz was acquired in 1986. Additional acreage and improvements were possible through the City of Thousand Oaks Redevelopment Agency. This 5-acre park was completed in 1989. Within the park stands the Crowley House, a five bedroom home and now historical landmark originally built in 1910. The house is now used as an office by Conejo Valley Neighborhood for Learning to promote school readiness and services for children 0-5 years.

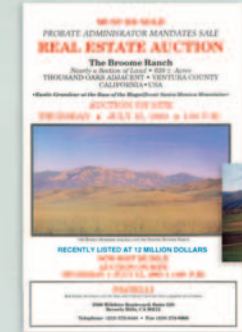

Known as Broome Ranch at the time of a probate auction, the Conejo Recreation and Park District, City of Thousand Oaks and Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority purchase 640 acres of residentially zoned property. State and National Parks now own and manage a portion of the former ranch. Twenty acres are leased to the City of Thousand Oaks for a public equestrian center and the remaining 300 acres along Lynn Road, originally slated for a golf course, are currently held in trust by the Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority for the Conejo Recreation and Park District and City of Thousand Oaks.



1993
The Greenmeadow Fire sweeps through the Conejo Valley.



1994
The Conejo Recreation and Park District is recognized as one of the nation's finest recreation and park agencies at the annual conference of the National Recreation and Park Association. This recognition would continue in 1995 and 1996.

Thousand Oaks Civic Arts Plaza opens – home of Thousand Oaks City Hall and the Countrywide Performing Arts Center. The Alliance for the Arts raises millions to support performing arts at the 1,800 seat Fred Kavli Theatre and 400 seat Scherr Forum Theatre.

Southern California is rocked by the Northridge earthquake. Thousand Oaks Library closed for several months.

- The Conejo Open Space Foundation was formed in 1995 to promote and maintain the open space and trail system of the Conejo Valley and to educate residents as to their roles as custodians and protectors of the open space and the environment.

McCrea Ranch • 216 Acres



1995
The 216 acres of the McCrea Ranch, located at the bottom of the Norwegian Grade was owned by movie stars from Hollywood's Golden Age. Western movie hero Joel McCrea and his wife and partner for 57 years, movie star Frances Dee raised their 4 sons and lived simply as part of the community. A friendship built on trust between McCrea and Tex Ward helped lay the foundation for the McCreas to donate their ranch and family home in 1995 to the Conejo Recreation and Park District effective in 2004. The ranch home and out buildings are listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

- 1996
- Seventh Day Adventist Specific Plan is approved, preserving 250 acres of open space.



1997
In 1997, the United States Youth Volleyball League (USYVL) was formed in the Conejo Valley. The first season included seven teams and 43 players. Today the USYVL has 34 teams and 244 players.



1998
The Conejo Recreation and Park District celebrates paying off bonds issued in 1970 by burning the bonds at the Labor Day Concert in the Park.

Soon thereafter, the Conejo Recreation and Park District entered into a 40-year agreement with Ride On Therapeutic Horsemanship to manage and maintain the facility. Ride On is a not-for-profit corporation open to the public and teaches horsemanship to children and adults with physical and mental disabilities.

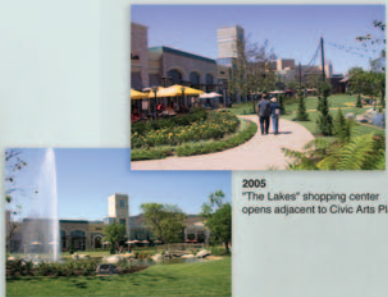

The event attracted more than 500 Conejo Valley-area residents eager to learn about available health & long-term care options, financial services, relevant public agencies, and more.



2016
March: The Safe Passage program holds its first Wildwood Overnight Campout. Started in 2012 with a partnership between CRPD and the Thousand Oaks Police Department, the program steers vulnerable youth away from risky behavior and possible gang affiliation. The program provides mentoring, tutoring, field trips, and positive role modeling for children living in areas with high crime rates.



2017
June: Six dedicated lighted pickleball courts are opened at Rancho Conejo Playfield. Pickleball is a paddle sport combining elements of tennis, badminton, and ping pong.



2015
July: The City of Thousand Oaks serves as a Host Town for the Special Olympics World Games, treating teams from Mongolia, Tajikistan, St. Vincent and the Grenadines, and San Marino to a full day of fun activities, complete with a parade & bbq at Conejo Creek North Park.



2015
In response to drought conditions, rising water prices, and statewide policies/laws encouraging reduction in outdoor water use, CRPD begins a 3-year project to convert non-essential turf to much and/or drought-tolerant plants. Water was turned off in portions of most parks, totaling approximately 70 acres.



2017
May: CRPD welcomes their Conejo Cottontail "Parker" to the District family. Parker toured the District for the next 12 months, visiting Summer Concerts, Community Centers, the Community Pool at CLU, Borchard Skatepark, and several District-wide events as well as local Conejo Valley landmarks including the Civic Arts Plaza, Thousand Oaks, Newbury Park, & Westlake High Schools; the Los Angeles Rams Training Facility, and Westlake Lake.



2018
November 7: Thousand Oaks experiences a mass shooting at The Borderline Grill & Bar, which took the lives of 12 people including a police officer. The community grieved and gathered around the 248 survivors with a #TOSTRONG campaign of support.



2019
November: "The strongest oaks have the deepest roots." The Healing Garden is dedicated on November 7, 2019, the 1-year anniversary of the Borderline shooting. Located in Conejo Creek North Park, the garden is a collaboration between the City of Thousand Oaks, Ventura County Sheriff's Office, and CRPD to offer a place for contemplation, meditation, and prayer.



2020
The COVID-19 virus circulates around the globe, sickening millions and resulting in shutdowns and unemployment levels not seen since the Great Depression. Due to quarantines and public health requirements, certain CRPD facilities are closed to the public for months.



2018
November 19: The Los Angeles Rams beat Kansas City Chiefs 54-51 in the highest scoring NFL Monday Night Football game ever. The Rams dedicated the game to the 12 victims of the November 7 Borderline & Grill shooting and to those impacted by the Woolsey and Hill fires, tragedies that hit very close to home for the team. Many Rams staff, players and their families had to evacuate from their homes due to the fires.



2018
November 8: Woolsey & Hill Fires: Burning 96,949 acres in Los Angeles and Ventura Counties – consuming a substantial portion of the Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area, the Woolsey Fire destroyed 1,643 structures, killed three people, and prompted the evacuation of more than 295,000 people. The Hill Fire burned 4,531 acres, destroyed two structures, and urged 75,000 to leave their homes. Community Centers served as shelters.

Sage Trail Community Park • 124 Acres

2018
Sage Trail Community Park is dedicated. Formerly known as Lang Ranch Community Park, the park includes a disc golf course, seating and barbecue areas, a bike skills course, a salpinae field, a Neighborhood Park, and trails for biking, hiking, and horseback riding. During the dedication, special recognition was paid to the City of Thousand Oaks and the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy for their financial contributions. Local user groups were also lauded for their support, including the Thousand Oaks Soaring Society, Conejo Disc Golf Club, Concerned Off-Road Bike Association, and the TOHS Cross Country program.



2019
December: The non-profit Play Conejo reaches a major milestone – more than \$1,000,000 has been raised and spent on playgrounds and recreation programs for economically disadvantaged kids.



2020
Despite playing in fan-free venues, both the Los Angeles Lakers and the Los Angeles Dodgers win their respective Championships – for the first time since 1988!



2019
October: The Alex Fiore Thousand Oaks Teen Center celebrates its 30th Anniversary.



2019
June: Lease agreements between the City and CRPD for the Alex Fiore Thousand Oaks Teen Center and the Goebel Adult Community Center are extended for 20 years and the City approves a \$2.7 million grant for Teen Center/Goebel Center upgrades.



2018
Banyan Park (spanning 7.4 acres) is expanded from its original four acres built in 1967, adding a shade structure, outdoor classroom area, walking paths, and drought tolerant landscaping.



2020
The Young Artists Ensemble presents their 40th Annual Teen Summer Musical! Due to restrictions related to the COVID-19 pandemic, they perform *The Pirates of Penzance* in virtual live-streamed performances for audiences at home or in a drive-in movie fashion.
